

Twining

In twining, a weft wraps around one or more warp ends. If the rows of twining are separated by plain weave, then a shed is needed, as shown in the example below; two rows of twining are separated by one shot of plain weave and the two groups are separated by three shots of plain weave.



If not separated by plain weave, twining can be done even on a frame loom without a shed. The twining generally goes in both directions. Below is an example woven using rag strips which make sturdy rugs.
